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

The tragic shootings in schools around the nation have led America as a nation to search its collective soul—and rightfully so. A scary proliferation of potential gunmen have reminded us regularly and well of a most disturbing thought: this could happen again—in my town, to my children or grandchildren, or to others I know and love.

The response to this devastating possibility has

been heartfelt and strong. So strong, in fact, that moral issues and the place of religious values in public life promise to be major issues in the upcoming political campaigns.

Politicians are already talking about the "decency deficit," "compassionate conservatism" and a government plan making it casier for one parent to stay at home.

"What went wrong?" is the question on the lips of so many Americans. "Whatever happened to the Christian virtues of kindness, unselfishness and love?" Or even more pain-

ful, "What is wrong with our families?"

What can we learn?

While there is no doubt a number of reasons behind the continued crumbling of values and virtues in our society, one rather large causative factor comes immediately to my mind. Interestingly enough, it's a problem my father was aware of, warned me of, and protected me from a number of years ago.

"You've got to be kidding!"

I can still hear the comments and see my friends smirking when I told them the truth—we didn't have a television in our home. Many thought my dad was, well—dare I say it?—too conservative. Today, in the light of young people lying in pools of blood, he looks progressive and wise.

What Dad saw on the television was not in harmony with Philippians 4:8: "Whatsoever things are true...honest...just...purc...lovely...of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these

things."

Today, with the realities of school violence burned into our collective conscience, the Christian conscience, the Christian value of guarding what we see has a new appeal. Our homes and churches must become places of refuge from the restless and violent evil that fills the world. Television, music and video games should be under the control of Philippians 4:8. If they can't be controlled, then consider my dad's solution.

The undeniable connection between violence and what we see and hear has made me increasingly thankful for the decision my father made more than 30

years ago. I didn't understand the reasons for what he was doing then, but I do now. My father has been gone for a few years, but every Father's Day (and in between) I think of him and wish I could tell him thanks. And if I could, I think I would say something like this: "Dad, even though you sleep in the grave and know nothing of these tragedies, your faith still works. Thanks for believing your Bible and sparing me from ten thousand scenes of murder and fornication, not to men-

tion the beer commercials.

"I know that the absence of TV and rock music didn't make you or your family perfect. Even without a televison there were plenty of temptations. And you knew that too.

"I don't think I need to guess what you would have said about violent video games. You understood how impressionable your boys were. Sometimes I thought you didn't know much about boys, especially teenage boys. Now I understand—you knew a lot.

"Thanks for not giving in to my pleading and begging for a television. Thanks for standing firm when relatives and others thought you were taking Scripture a little too seriously.

"Thanks for all the times you played with us in the yard instead of hunkering down and watching someone else play. Thanks for your hugs and kisses. Thanks for your discipline. I didn't like it then, but I am grateful for it today.

"And, finally, thanks for being a man of faith. If only there could have been more Christian dads like you, then the nightmare of Littleton and beyond might never have been a reality."



ithout question, an invasion of termites is one of the worst things that can happen to a house. Whenever these gnawing little pests arrive en masse, they eat away at the very structure of a building, until the walls themselves are weakened and worthless. Interestingly enough, termite-infested wood looks fine on the outside. But split it open, and the insides have literally been earen out, making it useless even for firewood.

My father was well aware of the termite threat. In fact, he was always concerned about it. Long before the day of environmental enlightenment, he poured used motor oil around the foundation of our frame house. And Dad's method worked very well although no environmentally aware person would use it today.

In these high-tech times, invading termites face a sophisticated arsenal of termiteprevention tools. Treated wood, professional exterminators and high-powered pesticides have replaced the simple methods used by my father so many years ago. But while we have become expert at protecting our houses from traditional termite invasions, we as a nation have failed-miserably failed—at protecting our homes from

an equally murderous influx of termite-like predators.

PROTECTING YOUR FAMILY

Your home is more than a house—it is your family. And home should be the dearest thing on earth to you-a place to be honored and protected because your family is there. Yet we as a society seem to know much more about house maintenance than home maintenance. We spend a lot more time taking care of our bouses than our bowes.

This is an extremely dangerous situation, for families need just as much protection as the wood inside their walls. Families are built or destroyed by what fills their minds. The saying "by beholding we be-

come changed" is just as true today as it was 2000 years ago. Families become what they think! In our efforts to protect our family structure, then, we need to guard the "driveways of our minds" in a careful and deliberate way.

Unfortunately, the structure and very foundation of the American home has been dangerously invaded, yes invaded, by a whole new breed of termites. While we were nearly

oblivious to their presence, they have been quietly chewing—chewing away at our values.

This is especially damaging, for values are what make homes, homes. Values are the ties that bind our family relationships, which bring so much joy and happiness into our lives. They act like white blood cells, fighting off invasive elements and keeping the home healthy. A family can absorb a lot of punishment as long as their immune system is in order. But destroy the immune system, and the family itself is in trouble. When values are eroded, the very foundation of a home becomes like a termite-eaten board. And the resultthe inevitable result—is the decay and crumbling of the home.

THE DEVIL'S HIT LIST

In his Herculean efforts to destroy the home, the devil is especially focused on the very best defense of a home—its family values. A list of family values on the devil's hit list would undoubtedly include love, which is the very principle of unselfishness. The idea of putting God first, others second and ourselves last is foundational to a happy and healthy home. The devil doesn't like integrity either, for honesty in what we say and promise builds security in our home and other relationships.

Trust, especially in the marriage vows, is another "no-no." The devil wants to put all our promises, of any kind, in jeopardy. Self-control is another virtue the devil bates. He wants passions—sex drives in overdrive and "mistemper"—to rule and ruin, making homes unmanageable and dysfunctional.

And, of course, the devil hates courtesy and thoughtfulness, those wonderful attributes that smooth the rough edges of our human existence.

REPLACEMENT VALUES?

While a host of stellar family values guards the citadel of a healthy family unit, there is an equally compelling (and rather different) list that works against these values. Not surprisingly, these "anti-values" are some of the very ideas promoted by television, Hollywood, movies, rock music and the media. They promote "values" such as greed, violence, lust, deceit, brutality, drugs and perverted sex. Fortunately, an increasing number of Americans are seeing the connection between these "antivalues" and their avid promoters.

Recently, I heard an expert representing the American Medical As-

sociation (AMA) note that "there is no question that watching violent behavior produces violent behavior." We see this principle at work in America all the

time. Whenever some grisly crime hits the news, copycat crimes are soon to follow. Movies have the same effect. According to recent research released by the AMA, "the risks of viewing the most common depictions of televised violence include learning to behave violently, becoming more desensitized to the harmful consequences of violence and becoming more fearful of being attacked."

In other words, by watching violent and brutal behavior, one learns to become violent and brutal. One also learns to be afraid. Maybe this is why so many Americans are buying guns and taking up the martial arts.

The AMA also found that:

- Eight-year-old boys who viewed the most violent programs during their childhood were the most likely to engage in aggressive and delinquent behavior by age 18 and serious criminal behavior by age 30.
- TV violence affects youngsters of all ages, both genders, all socioeconomic levels and all levels of intelligence. The effect is not limited to children predisposed to aggressive behavior.

OTHER "TERMITE" THREATS

Of course, TV violence is not the only termite-like threat to the values of our society. The Internet, when misused, is an equally dangerous foe.

Many, including the FBI, are deeply concerned that child molesters are stalking children through the Internet. In addition, pictures of violence and sexual perversion can easily be found by children as well as adults. For example, Oklahoma bomber Timothy McVeigh got his inspiration straight from the Internet, where he located a book advocating the violent overthrow of the government.

Recently, I heard a sad story of a marriage broken up by unwise Internet use. The trouble actually started earlier when one spouse began reading romance novels. Then came the exciting discovery of the Internet, together with an entire retinue of real people in the chat rooms who were all too ready and willing to bring fantasies of the mind to life. The ruin of a fine family was the unfortunate result, together with all the heartache and pain caused by the situation. Unfortunately, this type of story is becoming all too common.

THE ROLE OF VIDEO GAMES

Then, of course, there are the violent video games. Despite arguments to the contrary, chopping up lifelike screen opponents can and does impact a 14-year-old boy. You don't need a Ph.D. to figure that out either. With their realistic depictions of increasingly graphic blood and gore, these games strongly reinforce the killer instinct. As a result, the minds of many of the children have become so hardened that even the most despicable of crimes—killing their own families—can become a remorseless reality.

Have you ever wondered why we are building so many prisons? Unless there are some dramatic changes, many more prisons will have to be built. And why? To house the exploding prison population of young men and women whose feelings of human compassion have been totally removed by violent TV, music and/or video games.

MUSIC TELEVISION (MTV)

President Clinton is a declared fan of MTV, which seductively promotes adultery, fornication and human indecency. Perhaps that was the inspiration that tarnished the nation and the office of the president of the United States. One can only shudder at what the next generations will be like, with their minds filled with this garbage.

Have you ever wondered why teenage pregnancy has skyrocketed among all groups and races? In some communities more babies are born out of wedlock than in it. It's bad enough when teenagers follow the movie star cult, thinking it's cool to engage in illicit sex. But what about the children they produce? While a few of the lucky ones may be adopted into good homes, most are kept and reared by parents who are still children themselves. Doesn't anyone care about the children condemned to live in misery and confusion because of the sex worship promoted by the powerful media of movies, sitcoms, rap and rock music?

Many people argue that since movies aren't real, they don't affect the way we act. But if movies and music don't impact our behavior, why do businesses spend billions, yes, billions of dollars for ads? Because they work, that's why. Trillions of dollars have been made because of 30-second ads, many of which are aimed at America's most vulnerable audience—the children.

THE WORK OF THE TERMITES

You see, it is the termites, those cure little bugs from Hollywood, that are eating the values out of our homes. Oh, they wring their hands when the spotlights are turned on their dark little tunnels. They will tell you, with tears, that they simply reflect the condition of society—rather

than shape it.

Hollywood, the music industry and the media gangs are not really interested in family. They never have been. They are interested in money. They have studied human nature very carefully, discovering that when you touch a person's emotions, you get their attention. If you can get them to laugh or cry, rage or relax, be passionate or intense, you can infuse them with your message.

Of course, emotions are very important. But when our senses are artificially and continuously stimulated, it takes increasingly dramatic input to get a response. Imbibing today's entertainment scene is like eating bot chili peppers. The more you eat, the more your taste demands. Illicit drugs work the same way: you start with something mild, but soon you look for a harder, more exciting kick.

The problem with all this stuff is that people know they are hooked, but they like it. They really don't care to be unhooked—until it is time to pay the devil. Then they want deliverance from all the misery it causes.

THE COMING EARTHQUAKE

There is a moral earthquake coming. In fact, it's already shaking our homes. And the people do want help. With desperate cries they call for Superman, but he doesn't show. He's tied up in a video tape! They plead


and unselfishness continued to shine.

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



s patents, one of the best gifts we can pass on to our children is the gift of faith. While there are no guarantees that this gift will grow to maturity, we can, like careful gardeners, prepare the soil of their hearts so that God's Word can sprout and grow in it. The foundation we help lay and the gift of faith we leave our children will then assist them as they navigate through life.

In addition to making God's Word the moral compass for your home (see the article on page 10), there are eight steps you can take to lay a solid foundation, pass on your spiritual heritage to your children and help them begin to grasp the gift of faith:

1. Begin With the End in Sight

Parents who are intentional about the direction they would like their children to go will spend time developing a family mission statement. They will ask their family questions like these:

- What is the most important mission, or goal, for our family to work toward?
 - What are our current priorities?
- Does the way we spend our time reflect our priorities?
 - Why do we care about our family?
- What does our family do to support and strengthen its members and its community?

 What would be missing in the world if our family ceased to exist?

Answers to these questions can be used to write the reason for their family's existence. In addition to developing a mission statement, parents may spend time thinking about what a mature Christian faith looks like. Parents will begin to develop goals and hopes for their children as they envision all they can be.

Your list may look different from mine,

but if time is spent early on looking at the end result of the time allotted you to nurture your children, you will no doubt begin to chart a course for development to take place—physical, mental, emotional and spiritual.

What would be missing in the world if our family ceased to exist?

Like sailors, who navigate ships from one continent to another, we too will face rough seas and strong winds. Looking ahead will help us be prepared to encounter detours along the way, and it will help us realize we need the wisdom of our Heavenly Father as we begin this journey.

2. Model Success and Failure

Children are naturally great imitators. For better or worse, they mimic adult behavior all the time. Jesus said, "A student is not above bis teacher, but everyone who is fully trained will be like his teacher" (Luke 6:40, NIV). As parents, you and I are our children's most important teachers. And whether we like it or not, they will become like their most important teachers—us! Our children are watching what we do and how we act.

No parent is 100 percent successful as a model, but when we do fail to model successfully, we need to then model the proper actions to take after we've messed up. Children will be given the opportunity to see Jesus' strength working through our weaknesses. Teach your children to interpret failures as learning experiences. If parents will also see failures as learning experiences, we will more carefully determine the course of discipline we choose to apply as we attempt to help our children learn from their mistakes.

3. Establish Family Traditions

Besides being fun, traditions preserve a family's heritage and give each family member a sense of shared identity. Through traditions, values are handed down from generation to generation. Traditions to celebrate include:

 Milestones, such as birthdays, graduations, anniversaries, accepting Christ, baptisms, etc.

- Annual traditions, such as trips to visit grandparents, holidays, the last day of school, camping trips, etc.
- Weekly traditions, such as family play nights, worship times and date nights between one parent and one child.
- Daily traditions, such as eating together, story time, morning devotions and evening prayers.

4. Express Your Love in Many Ways

Spend time studying the ways Jesus said "I love you" while on this earth. He used many different ways. In the book *The Five Love Languages*, Gary Chapman divides ways of expressing love into five categories:

- · acts of service,
- · words of affirmation,
- · quality time,
- · gift giving, and
- physical touch.

According to Chapman, every person has a dominant love language. And while we may be well-intentioned in expressing our love, it must be communicated in a way the receiver understands.

As parents, we need to realize that saying "I love you" to children is not enough. We need to become familiar with our child's love language, look for unique ways to express our love, and understand that our message of love is more likely to come through loud and clear when we express it in many ways.

Broaden Your Child's View of Life

Many times children appear to be reared in a vacuum, with little exposure to the world around them and a lack of guidance to help them interpret their experiences. You can enlarge your child's perspective of life by:

- Involving him or her in acts of service. Help your child discover that faith is not just about head knowledge or heart attitudes—it's about what we do with our hands, feet, resources and time.
- Pursuing activities to expand their knowledge of other cultures. You can do this by modeling respect for people of different races and establishing friendships with them. This will help your children understand God's pleasure in creating all humans similarly, yet unique, and they will learn to enjoy their place as part of God's unique creation.
- Helping your children discover that they are uniquely equippd with many God-given talents and

A Moral Compass for Your Home

"Troubled" youngsters are not always easy to spot. I know, because I ran into one during my senior year of high school. He came by one night while I was working in the yearbook office, and he couldn't have been more helpful. Noticing that I was doing my work by the light of a single, underpowered bulb, he cheerfully fetched me a better light.

Just a few days later, I was shocked and amazed to find he wasn't the person I thought I knew. Beneath his jovial ways with classmates was a bottled rage that eventually exploded. That very weekend he ended the lives of his grandparents-turned-parents in a bloody killing spree reported by both local and national networks. His motive? To collect an insurance premium, thereby becoming independently wealthy.

I can remember thinking many things then—like why didn't we see this coming? What if he had taken out his rage at school? And, what if I had been the recipient of his anger that quiet night when I encountered him, alone? Twenty years later, I look at that tragedy through different eyes—the eyes of a parent. And with the recent

violence committed by children in our nation, I ponder what might lead to these actions in children.

How do children, who have so much to offer, turn down a violent path? How do children, with the capacity to extend kindness, transform into hateful and apparently remorseless human beings? What was their upbringing like? Did the parents have clues? How much of this violence is the result of personal choices? How much is a result of the self-centered society in which they are reared? What place does the media play in this—with the visual images of murders flashing on the television from early morning cartoons to late night action adventure shows?

LOOKING FOR ANSWERS

Children in today's world are confused and looking for answers. Life is no longer cut and dried. Children have

abilities and also ways they can use their talents to help others.

• Teaching your children about nature. The experience children have in nature and the opportunities parents take to help explain the mysteries of God revealed through His marvelous creation, will not only instill in them the value of all living things but will also point to His power, majesty and great love for us.

Memorize Scripture with your children, and teach them to apply it to their everyday lives.

6. Bring God Into Your Children's World

Acquaint your children with the presence of God in your home, and teach them that this is a natural thing—by establishing routines of spiritual discipline in the home, such as family worships, personal devotions, mealtime prayers, bedtime prayers, etc. Church and church school opportunities are other important avenues for planting God's Word in the hearts of your children. Memorize Scripture with your children, and teach them to apply it to

their everyday lives. They will soon realize it holds the answers to the successes, disappointments, questions and crises they encounter.

7. Teach Your Children to Reach Out to God

"An adult's attitude of reverence and sincerity is keenly felt by a child," writes Wes Haystead, author of Teaching Your Child About God. "Although the child may not under-

According to Haystead, many of a child's feelings, thoughts and practices

concerning prayer will be determined by the adult models the child observes. If your conception of prayer is formal or vague, your child is likely to feel the same way.

Make your prayers conversational, and let your children see your relationship with God through them. Help them to see prayer as a relationship, not a memorized ritual. Teach them that no concern of theirs is too insignificant for God.

Take Time for Faith Talks and the Miracle of the Moment

Opportunities will arise through-

out the day that naturally provide times to speak about God and to apply His wisdom to situations you encounter with your children. Take advantage of these teachable moments, and spend time sharing your stories of faith with your children. Showing them how God has blessed and led in your life will help them see God is real and an integral part of your life.

Parenting With Confidence

These eight steps will go a long way toward preparing your children's hearts for the Holy Spirit to work. I invite you to step out in faith and become partners with God in nurturing your children, knowing that God, who cares for our children even more than we do, will work in their lives to mold them according to His purpose.

The apostle Paul tells us that we can work hard to plant and to water the seeds, to provide every opportunity for our children to know God—but it is God who provides the growth. (See 1 Cor. 3:7.) And He who has begun a good work in you (and your children) will be faithful to complete it.

As partners with God, we can have great expectations and parent with confidence. Happy planting!

IT CONTAINS VALUABLE INFORMATION

Every manufacturer provides an owner's manual. What person would buy a new car—or even a used one—and ignore it? The owner's manual contains very valuable information—advice that could save you thousands of dollars in repair bills in the future, or even the life of the ear! It lists what type of oil to use; when to change the hoses, filters, and belts; when to have it serviced; and much, much more. Who would lay down thousands of

Each of your 30 trillion cells performs an average of 10,000 chemical functions every day. But the brain and spinal cord, which orchestrate the whole process, weigh less than 3 pounds! Imagine, Just one stress reaction produces more than 1,400 known physiological responses! Your heart beats more than 100,000 times daily to move blood 168 million miles around your body, and you take about 23,800 breaths a day to bring about 438 cubic feet of air to your lungs. The psalmist David expressed it best when he declared, "I will praise Thee, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made: marvellous are 'Thy works; and that my soul knoweth right well." (Ps. 139:14).

SOLDEN WAFFLES"

Ingredients:

8 C Rolled oats

3/4 C Soy flour

1/2 C Corn meal (optional)

1/2 C Dates or 1/3 C Honey

2 tsp Salt

4 Tb Vanilla or 3 Tb Maple extract

Directions:

- *Put all ingredients in large bowl.
- Add 10-12 C water, or enough to make it blendable.
- Blend mixture, 3 C at a time, until smooth; add water, if necessary, to help mixture blend.
- Transfer blended batter into another bowl as you go.

- Cook for 8-10 minutes in a sprayed waffle iron
- Cool on rack and, if possible, wait until next day to eat.

Serving Suggestions:


- As the batter sits, it will thicken, so you
 may have to add some water. If your waffles
 are too crispy and thin, your batter is too
 thin. If waffles are heavy and solid, you did
 not add enough water. The consistency of
 the batter should be a little thinner than a
 cake mix.
- These waffles freeze well and are delicious as a main breakfast dish. We also love to make sandwiches from them for picnics.
- To heat, just pop them into the toaster or heat in a low-heat oven right on the rack.



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Don't Let Anything or Anyone Devalue Your Values

hether we realize it or not, we are what our values make us. Values, like honesty, kindness, generosity and service, act as a decision-making rudder, steering behavior.

HEAD VERSUS HEART VALUES

The problem is a lot of people have "head" values—they know what they should do—but they don't have "heart" values. In other

words, they have been taught certain values and know the right answers, but they haven't incorporated these values into their internal moral code, which gives them the willpower to act on them. To add to the confusion, your values (if not principle-based) are always in a state of flux. They are constantly being influenced by your culture, family, friends and the media—that which you read, watch or hear.

Notice how the value of honesty has changed over the years. What would you do if you found a wallet loaded with ten and twenty dollar bills, or if you saw a large number of dollar bills lying on the table of a restaurant, a tip left by a previous customer? The answer is simple. You would do everything possible to find the owner. Right? Well, that's not what most people would do.

"Finders-keepers" seems to be the accepted moral code today. Even though God's law is clear, "Thou shalt not steal," many rationalize their dishonest behavior. "Society owes it to me because of the way I've been treated." "I was praying that God would help me get some money—and suddenly there it was."

Others make their moral decisions based on who the victim was. They reason that it's worse to keep the money if the person stolen from is poor rather than rich. It's even less objectionable if it's an institution or the government that is cheated.

BUILDING AN INTERNAL CODE

Adults should be making moral decisions that are based on unchanging principles. In other words, you judge whether something is right or wrong based on an internalized set of moral standards. Individuals who make principled decisions consider questions such as: How will my action affect others? What if everyone were to do this? What does God say about this behavior?

Without an internalized moral code, you will be swept away by various pressures, regardless of your

age; the pressure to win; or your desire to be accepted, get attention, or gratify self.

What makes people who know better choose to go against their consciences? Why are your "head" values—that which you verbalize—not always the same as your "heart" values—that which you do?

Chances are, it's because you are still making value decisions based on childish, immature levels of moral decision making, such as whether:

- you'll be punished or rewarded,
- your action is "naughty or nice," or
- some authority says to do or not do something.

How can you develop a strong internal moral code based on Bible principles and protect yourself (and your children) against the Pied Pipers of the world trying to corrupt your value system?

Base your personal value on God's value of you. You need to feel good about yourself because of what Christ has done for you. He has died for you and given you the gift of salvation. When you believe you are special, you don't have to compromise yourself or "buy" acceptance by saying yes to questionable activities. You can choose to turn off the TV, burn the trashy pictures, break the hard

rock CDs, and throw away the romance novels, even though it's not the popular thing to do. If you believe you're the son or daughter of royalty, you'll find it easier to act like it.

Establish a biblically based moral code for yourself

and your family. The earlier you take a strong stand as to the standards that are right for you, the

sooner you will empower your will to make right choices. Every time you make a value decision, a connection is made in your brain. The longer you choose to go against your conscience, the stronger that negative brain pathway becomes. When you make a decided choice based on principle, you actually start forming a new connection. The more decided and often that new choice is made, the faster a new habit will be formed.

stand you take as to what is morally and ethically right for you and your family, the more likely it is that your children will accept your standards and internalize them.

Your kids may not always like these standards, but they will respect them if they are reasonable and they can clearly see the biblical and principled basis for them.

When tempted to alter or violate your moral code, practice quoting Bible verses such as:

- "A soft answer turneth away wrath,"
 - · "It is written," and
- "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against Thee,"

That's what Jesus did, and as we follow His example, He will help us make decisions based on the best moral guide of all—His Word.

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
